David Geary Theatre Director Robert Wilson

Last month I mentioned Robert Wilson's THE BLACK RIDER, which is now at ACT in San Francisco. Wilson's productions are different! Most plays are predominately the author's words. When Wilson directs a play he makes it much more than what he says is "verbal ping pong". He uses light, color, time, music, and sound. He uses them in many different, often unusual ways, and the author's words become just a small part of the experience.

I saw Wilson's HAMLET, in Houston, and it was stunning. He only used Shakespeare's words. But he eliminated many of them, and repeated other words and phrases many times. He changed the scene sequence. He did amazing things with color and lighting. He cast himself to play all the parts! He used a small accessory held in his hand or on the stage in front of him as the cue to let us know which character he was performing. Ophelia was represented by a scarf, Hamlet by a dagger, etc. It wasn't Shakespeare as we know it, but it was wonderful!

Theater Comments by David Geary (continued)

Wilson prefers directing opera over modern classic plays. He feels that audiences do not appreciate having their favorite scene from their favorite play being upstaged by some stunning effect which makes the words take a back seat. With opera there is little dialogue that matters and Wilson feels he is more free to do his wonderful effects.

One Wilson production I saw, Bruckner's DANTON'S DEATH, had many scenes played with all the body movements at less than half speed to emphasize their dreadful portent.

Actors tend to enjoy working with Wilson through the extensive designing and planning phases up through the first production. Wilson is very open to trying all ideas in an effort to get a better effect. But once an action is agreed, it is very precisely documented, and Wilson expects it to be repeated exactly that same way every time, down to the smallest movement of a finger. This probably can be very boring to an actor in a long run, as the actor probably is anxious to try something a little different to see if it could have good effect.

If your curiosity about Robert Wilson has been piqued, you might plan to see THE BLACK RIDER. Previous productions by Wilson of THE BLACK RIDER have been lauded. I am looking forward to seeing it. If you attend, please let me know what you think. David Geary

The trip to British Columbia was a real success with 10 Area 2 Fishermen and guests flying up to the Canadian wilderness for a week's salmon fishing. Branch 8 members included Rich Bal and Ed Dijkman. The trip was to a special backwoods lodge, which is run by a German couple and their family. The facilities can accommodate up to 52 people, but the owners keep the number of guests to about half so they can provide "the level of service that they expect". From the sound of it, those members attending were in fact pampered. The food was fabulous and areas fished pristine. That meant lots of catching and, once they limited out, catch and release was the order of the day. The latter allowed the participants to fish until their arms were about to drop off. Real paradise for a dedicated fisherman. Also, paradise for the bears, but that's another story. Both Rich Bal and Ed Dijkman came home with more than 70 pounds of filets. Get to know them better before the catch is all gone!!!! Lots of fun for all and most say they'll be going again next year. If interested, please call Rich Bal at 925 944-1832.

August 15th through 19th was the annual trip to New Melones Reservoir for kokanee salmon. Ten fishermen went on the trip. We stayed in more modest surroundings (double-wide trailers) than those who went on the B.C. trip, but these were more than adequate (means they were air-conditioned and the park had a small swimming pool in which to cool off from the heat of the day). The units lacked a stove or oven, but there was a cooking pavilion about 200' away, where the cooks could work their magic. Several of our members took advantage of the services of Guide Jim Stewart, who proved to be a really knowledgeable resource. We had 5 boats and so plenty of fishing time for all concerned. In all, the trip was a great success, with all involved bringing home lots of delicious fish. Tom Hensley caught the biggest (16 ¾" Kokanee). Most landed were smaller this year but more numerous than the prior year. We did see an up-tick in activity by German Brown Trout, several fishermen reporting their prize kokanee had been followed by or even bitten off by huge and voracious Browns. Here again, the meals were special and were topped off by the traditional last-night trip to the Murphy Hotel for prime rib dinner. Again, weather was hot and the trip lots of fun. Maybe we should do this in May???

Upcoming trips include day trips to the Delta and local reservoirs for salmon and stripers as conditions permit during August and September; to Eagle Lake for trout (October 10 to 15); to East Cape Baja, Mexico, in November; and to the Klamath River for steelhead in December (or as water conditions allow). There's much more to come, so, for those interested, attend one or more of our meetings (usually on the 4th Thursday of the Month) at the Legends Sports Bar and Grill at the Diablo Creek Golf Course at 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. 


