

Book Group 1 Rich Black

Book Group #1 will discuss the following books at Orinda Books at 10:15 am on the following dates.

Monday, June 24.. "The Code Breaker" by Walter Isaacson

Monday, July 22.. "American Dirt" by Cummins

Monday, August 26..."Road to Surrender" by Thomas

First Report.....Book Group #1 met on Monday, April 29, 2024 at Orinda Books to discuss "Black Death at the Golden Gate" by David Randall, an account of the efforts by officers of the Public Health Service, then the Marine Hospital Service, to thwart an epidemic of the Bubonic Plague in San Francisco which began in 1900 and subsided in 1908. Ignorance, racism, the power structure, commercial interests, and even medical arrogance all played a part in prolonging efforts to eliminate the Plague. In the end, one Dr. Rupert Blue held the plague at bay because he was willing and able to implement a program of rat eradication where other approaches proved unfeasible in the culture of the times.

Brad Stribling recommended the book while Richard Black led the discussion with Joel White, Art Donaldson, Mac McLoughlin, Mike Schneider, Garrett Girvan, John Kopchik, Dan Renke, Tim Tinnes, Todd Berman, and Dick Kauffman. Book Club #1 awarded the book 4.1 stars.

Second Report ...Book Group #1 met again on Monday, May 20, 2024 at Orinda Books to discuss

"Fever in the Heartland" by Timothy Egan, an account of the rise of the Indiana Ku Klux Klan, with parallel growth in other states, about 100 years ago. Concealed under white robes and cone masks, the KKK preached temperance, family values and racial supremacy of white Anglo-Saxon Protestants during the day while sponsoring lynching, cross burning and terrorism for Catholics, Jews, and African Americans at night. The Indiana chapter was the creation of David Stephenson, a con man and manipulator of mass psychology. Stephenson's undoing was the sadistic torture and rape of twentyseven year old Madge Oberholtzer who sought relief from Stephenson's assault by suicide but lived long enough to dictate a "dying declaration." The declaration, admitted as evidence at a trial, exposed the toxic hypocrisy of the KKK while leading a jury of Indiana farmers to convict Stephenson of murder. The exposure of the murderous debauchery of Klan leadership deflated Klan membership to near insignificance.

The group noted that the patterns in mass psychology which Stephenson engendered have emerged often in the ensuing 100 years including our present times with a divisive political environment engendered by both political parties.

Mac McLoughlan introduced the book while Richard Black led the discussion with Joel White, Art Donaldson, Garrett Girvan, John Kopchik, Dan Renke, Tim Tinnes, Todd Berman, and Steve Bort. Book Club #1 awarded the book 4.5 stars.

Brief summary of Half American

Story unfolds in the years during and after WWII.

Over one million Black men and women served in World War II. Black troops were at Normandy, Iwo Jima, and the Battle of the Bulge, serving in segregated units and performing unheralded but vital support jobs, only to be denied housing and educational opportunities on their return home. Without their crucial contributions to the war effort, the United States could not have won the war. And yet the stories of these Black veterans have long been

ignored.

Half American is American history as you've likely never read it before. In these pages are stories of Black heroes such as Thurgood Marshall, the chief lawyer for the NAACP, who investigated and publicized violence against Black troops and veterans; Benjamin O. Davis, Jr., leader of the Tuskegee Airmen, who was at the forefront of the years-long fight to open the Air Force to Black pilots; Ella Baker, the civil rights leader who advocated on the home front for Black soldiers, veterans, and their families; James Thompson, the 26-year-old whose letter to a newspaper laying bare the hypocrisy of fighting against fascism abroad when racism still reigned at home set in motion the Double Victory campaign; and poet Langston Hughes, who worked as a war correspondent for the Black press. Their bravery and patriotism in the face of unfathomable racism is both inspiring and galvanizing. In a time when the questions World War II raised regarding race and democracy in America remain troublingly relevant and still unanswered, this meticulously researched retelling makes for urgently necessary reading.
