Branch Executive Committee (BEC) Minutes - Summary Meeting of August 19, 2024

- Financial: Branch cash balance as of 8-1-24 is \$10,022.39. Reserve balance is \$12,383.06.
- Luncheon Attendance: 102 lunches were paid for even though only 99 were served due to members not cancelling their reservation in time to adjust the lunch count. The three menu choices for lunch were Chicken Fajitas, Shrimp Fajitas and Vegetarian Fajitas.
- **Membership**: Current active membership remains at 191.
- Activities: 26 activities are currently operating resulting in 27 activity days. Four activities still need a chairperson: Sunshine, Poker, Computer Tech and Travel.
- Holiday Party: The date of this year's

Holiday Party is December 17th at Boundary Oak. A four- person committee has been formed to organize the evening's festivities.

- Nominating Committee Selections: Chairperson Roger Craig presented to the BEC the list of Officer and Director nominations for 2025. A motion was passed to approve the nominations which will be presented to membership for approval at the September luncheon
- **Recruitment and Member Retention**: After a lengthy discussion on recruiting new members was initiated by Publicity Chair Rob Lemmo, resulting in numerous suggestions, a five-person committee was formed to come up with a plan to both facilitate recruitment and member retention.



Book Club 2 met September 19 to discuss <u>A Killing</u> <u>on the Hill</u> by Robert Dugoni. Members voted the book 3.9/5. A brief summary follows.

A Killing on the Hill

The Great Depression. High-level corruption. And a murder that's about to become Seattle's hottest mystery. It's the kind of story that can make a reporter's career. If he lives to write about it.

Seattle, 1933. The city is in the grips of the Great Depression, Prohibition, and vice. Cutting his teeth on a small-time beat, hungry and ambitious young reporter William "Shoe" Shumacher gets a tip that could change his career. There's been a murder at a social club on Profanity Hill—an underworld magnet for vice crimes only a privileged few can afford. The story is going to be front-page news, and Shoe is the first reporter on the scene.

The victim, Frankie Ray, is a former prizefighter. His accused killer? Club owner and mobster George

Miller, who claims he pulled the trigger in selfdefense. Soon the whole town's talking, and Shoe's first homicide is fast becoming the Trial of the Century. The more Shoe digs, the more he's convinced nothing is as it seems. Not with a tangle of conflicting stories, an unlikely motive, and witnesses like Ray's girlfriend, a glamour girl whose pretty lips are sealed. For now.

In a city steeped in Old West debauchery, Shoe's following every lead to a very dangerous place—one that could bring him glory and fame or end his life.

Book Group 1 Rich Black

Book Group #1 met on Monday, September 23, 2024 at Orinda Books to discuss There There by Tommy Orange. We were introduced to this book, Orange's first novel, by Todd Berman who offered much of the following synopsis. A large number – over a dozen – characters are developed, most of whom are Native American by ancestry though a couple may not be fully cognizant of it. Some of these characters are unexpectedly related – offspring of rape or anonymous adoption – and the plot brings them together in emotional and tension filled manner. And most of these 'urban native' (in Oakland, California) characters are seriously compromised by alcohol and substance abuse and are in dysfunctional relationships and families. And... many of them harbor deep mistrust, resentment, even hostility towards America and its government and want things back 'the way they used to be'.

Moreover, many seek to maintain cultural traditions such as tribal dancing in traditional regalia along with associated drumming, as will be done in a huge 'powwow' in the Oakland Coliseum, and they are participation excitedly planning their and performance in this event. Other of the characters, who are members of native help agencies including AA, are to coordinate the powwow and award monetary prizes. And yet certain other of the characters, under the control and direction of a hierarchy of drug lords, set about robbing the event of the prize money, shooting people as necessary using 3-D printed 'ghost guns'. Not surprisingly the

result is a chaotic, confusing, riot of suffering, injury, and death.

The book group praised the character development though two of us had to resort to using an 'org chart' of the characters to stay on track. All agreed that, though uncomfortable, exposure to the views and attitudes of this cultural entity was of much value. Even the final thoughts before death of a few of the shooting victims was enlightening. A repeated question by the group was the 'why'... what was the author's motivation for writing this? Our general speculation was that Tommy Orange wanted to expose readers to the difficulties and sentiments of this important but somewhat invisible American cultural entity.

This week's participants, including Tim Tinnes, Art Donaldson, Todd Berman, Jim Flesner, John Kopchik, Mac McLoughlin, Dan Renke, Mike Schneider, Garrett Girvan, and Brad Stribling, awarded this book 3.6 stars.

- With no TV, you spent your childhood "playing outside". There was no city playground for kids.
- The lack of television in your early years meant that you had little real understanding of what the world was like.
- We got "black-and-white" TV in the late 50s that had 3 stations and no remote.
- Telephones (if you had one) were one to a house and hung on the wall in the kitchen (who cares about privacy).
- Computers were called calculators; they were hand-cranked.
- Typewriters were driven by pounding fingers, throwing the carriage, and changing the ribbon. INTERNET and GOOGLE were words that did not exist.
- Newspapers and magazines were written for

adults and your dad would give you the comic pages after he read the news.

- The news was broadcast on your radio in the evening. The radio network gradually expanded from 3 stations to thousands.
- New highways would bring jobs and mobility. Most highways were 2 lanes and there were no Motorways.
- You went to the city to shop.
- You walked to school and back.
- Your parents were suddenly free from the confines of the depression and the war, and they threw themselves into working hard to make a living for their families.
- You weren't neglected, but you weren't today's all-consuming family focus.
- They were glad you played things like Fiddle Sticks, Grab, Monopoly, Marbles, and Jacks by yourselves. They were busy discovering the postwar world.
