SIR 116 Member Relations Report on Food & Service during Branch Meetings

One major issue that 2024 January SIR 116 survey highlighted that there was considerable member dissatisfaction with monthly luncheon food quality, service and price. Thirty-five of eighty-six responders complained that the food quality and service were not commensurate with the price of the luncheon. To address these issues, the BEC formed a special committee to work with Boundary Oak Management as well as SIR Branches 8 and 146 (which also have their monthly meetings at Boundary Oak.)

During April, we had several brainstorming meetings among three SIR branches to focus on specific food and service issues and then met with Boundary Oak staff and Manager, Mike Ash. We presented our findings and observations to them and they agreed on several changes. These changes were implemented starting with the July, 2024 meeting.

During both July and August luncheons, I placed "comment" sheets on each table so that our members can write down their complaints {and compliments} related to food and service. The responses during both meetings were overwhelmingly positive. Our members reported that food quality was improved and service was exceptional. We will continue to poll our membership in future meetings to ensure that the improvements made by Boundary Oak are sustaining.

Book Club 2 met at Arbolado Park on Thursday, August 15 to discuss The Frozen River by Ariel Lawton. The group voted the book a 4.5/5. Most of us felt this is an exceptionally well written book.

The Frozen River, by Ariel Lawton

Maine, 1789: When the Kennebec River freezes, entombing a man in the ice, Martha Ballard is summoned to examine the body and determine cause of death. As a midwife and healer, she is privy to much of what goes on behind closed doors in Hallowell. Her diary is a record of every birth and death, crime and debacle that unfolds in the close-knit community. Months earlier, Martha documented the details of an alleged rape committed by two of the town's most respected gentlemen—one of whom has now been found dead in the ice. But when a local physician undermines her conclusion, declaring the death to be an accident, Martha is forced to investigate the shocking murder on her own.

Over the course of one winter, as the trial nears, and whispers and prejudices mount, Martha doggedly pursues the truth. Her diary soon lands at the center of the scandal, implicating those she loves, and compelling Martha to decide where her own loyalties lie.

Clever, layered, and subversive, Ariel Lawhon's newest offering introduces an unsung heroine who refused to accept anything less than justice at a time when women were considered best seen and not heard. The Frozen River is a thrilling, tense, and tender story about a remarkable woman who left an unparalleled legacy yet remains nearly forgotten to this day.

Book Group #1 met on Monday September 23, 2024 at Orinda Books to discuss the "The Road to Surrender" by Evan Thomas, an account of events in the spring and summer of 1945 climaxing in the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki followed by Emperor Hirohito's radio announcement of surrender. Simple, right? That's what we learned in

school. This book presents the dynamics of Japanese intra government conflict at the highest level which very well could have resulted in a bloodbath for millions of Japanese resistors and casualties in the millions for American troops. In Washington senior military and civilian politicians debated where and when to use the bomb, while the actual delivery of the bombs was chancier than often presented.

Joel White introduced the book while Richard Black led the discussion with Todd Berman, Art Donaldson, Paul Freitas, Dick Kauffman, John Kopchik, Peter Loew, Dan Renke, Brad Stribling, and Noel Concepcion. Book Club #1 awarded the book 4.2 stars for the quality of the writing and its exploration of a little understood critical time.

Mexican Train Dominos Richard Madden

Mexican Train" is a domino game which uses a set of Double Twelve Dominoes. From 2 to 8 can play. Each player draws 11 to 15 dominoes. The number of dominoes each player draws depends on the number of players. The object of the game is to play all your dominoes. When you draw your hand, you set it up so that the adjacent dominoes match. During the play of a round there are things that can derail your train so that you cannot play.
