Book Group 2 Scott Clark

Book Club 2 members met January 16 to discuss <u>Demon of Unrest</u> by Erik Larson.

Members in attendance voted the book a 3.5/5

The Demon of Unrest by Eric Larson

On November 6, 1860, Abraham Lincoln became the fluky victor in a tight race for president. The country was bitterly at odds; Southern extremists were moving ever closer to destroying the Union, with one state after another seceding and Lincoln powerless to stop them. Slavery fueled the conflict, but somehow the passions of North and South came to focus on a lonely federal fortress in Charleston: Fort Sumter.

Erik Larson offers a gripping account of the chaotic months between Lincoln's election and the Confederacy's shelling of Sumter—a period marked by tragic errors and miscommunications, enflamed egos and craven ambitions, personal tragedies and betrayals. Lincoln himself wrote that the trials of these five months were "so great that, could I have anticipated them, I would not have believed it possible to survive them."

At the heart of this suspense-filled narrative are

Major Robert Anderson, Sumter's commander and a former slave owner sympathetic to the South but loyal to the Union; Edmund Ruffin, a vain and bloodthirsty radical who stirs secessionist ardor at every opportunity; and Mary Boykin Chesnut, wife of a prominent planter, conflicted over both marriage and slavery and seeing parallels between both. In the middle of it all is the overwhelmed Lincoln, battling with his duplicitous Secretary of State, William Seward, as he tries desperately to avert a war that he fears is inevitable—one that will eventually kill 750,000 Americans.

Drawing on diaries, secret communiques, slave ledgers, and plantation records, Larson gives us a political horror story that captures the forces that led America to the brink—a dark reminder that we often don't see a cataclysm coming until it's too late.

Book Group 1 Rich Black

Book Group #1 will discuss the following books at Orinda Books at 10:15 am on the following dates.

- Monday, February 24..." Isaacs's Storm" by Eric Larson
- Monday, March 24, ...Empress of the Nile" by Lynne Olson
- Monday, April 28,..." The Barn" by Wright Thompson

This month's report is a doubleheader since Book Group #1 met twice in January.

On January 6, 2025, the group discussed "The Emerald Mile" by Kevan Fedarko, an account of simultaneous and interacting events: the June 1983 release of unprecedented snowmelt into the Colorado River of the Grand Canyon by the staff of the Glen Canyon Dam and the successful attempt by three river guides, Kenton Grua, Steve Reynolds and Rudy Petschek to ride this discharge to a new speed record for a transit of the river (36 hours, 38 minutes, 29 seconds). The group found Fedarko's prose an engaging concurrent discussion of canyon exploration, dam construction, and the epic race while also exploring the inherent tradeoffs of the 20th-century conservation movement with the imperative to prevent floods, supply water, and generate power.

Todd Berman introduced the book while Richard

Black led the discussion with Paul Freitas, Garrett Girvan, Dick Kauffman, Peter Loew, John Riordan, Brad Stribling, Tim Tinnes, Art Donaldson, Larry Setren, and Bill Trilsch.

Book Club #1 awarded the book 4.1 stars for this account of three river guides who challenged nature and themselves with near-poetic ambition.

On January 27, 2025, Book Group #1 discussed "The Frozen River," a work of fiction that drew upon the facts from the life of Martha Ballard, a late 18thcentury midwife from Hallowell, Maine. A body frozen in river ice is retrieved and examined by the midwife, who judges that he was hanged. In some sense, this is a detective novel, a who-done-it. In another sense, it is a reimagining of love, conflicts, family loyalty, greed, and the panoply of personal relationships in a different time, which resonates with our time. As might be expected in a tale about a midwife, the agony and triumphs of the labor and delivery process received considerable attention in this novel. John Riordan recommended the book, and Richard Black led the discussion with Todd Berman, Steve Bort, Art Donaldson, Jim Flessner, Paul Freitas, Dick Kauffman, Peter Loew, Mac McLoughlan, Eric McNamara, Dan Renke, Brad Stripling, Bill Trilsch and Joel White. The group awarded the book 4.1 stars.



We believe that we are serving our SIR branch well and welcome any input on how to improve and better serve our members. And no, we do not have a method to exchange audio or ebooks at present.


